Enhancing Livelihoods through Artificial Insemination Services under FDP Guna, Madhya Pradesh





Under FDP Guna, supported by HDFC Bank Parivartan, Artificial Insemination (AI) services are being implemented to enhance livestock breed quality, resulting in more high-yielding female calves. By providing access to superior genetics at a minimal cost, End Poverty and HDFC Bank Parivartan are enabling farmers to increase income, reduce maintenance costs, and ensure long-term improvement in herd productivity and livelihood stability.

End Poverty Mitigates Stubble Burning Under Bank of America in North Harvana





Massive scale activity is carried out in the Stubble management project with support of CSR initiative of Bank of America to mitigate stubble burning, implemented by End Poverty. Under this initiative, a total of 7,238 farmers in Kurukshetra managed 86,257 acres through interventions involving baler (80,491 acres) and Superseeder (5,766 acres) equipment, utilizing 65 balers and 80 superseeders. Approximately 8,950 quintals (895 tons) of stubble were stored, while a total of 20,12,275 quintals (2,01,227 tons) of stubble were cleared through leasing and linkage models. In Karnal, 2,613 farmers participated, covering 19,653 acres with 65 balers. About 9,000 quintals of stubble were stored, and 4,91,325 quintals (49,312 tons) of stubble were cleared using the same model.



Cattle Health, Community Wealth

A Jhharoda Village Success Story



In Jhharoda village, Rewari, a Cattle Health Camp under the LIC HFL HRIDAY Project, implemented by End Poverty, created new learning opportunities for local farmers. Among the participants was Mrs. Sunita Devi, a progressive dairy farmer determined to enhance her cattle's health and productivity.



During the camp, she learnt about scientific dairy farming practices, including the use of mineral mixtures, liquid calcium, and balanced cattle feed. Encouraged by the veterinary experts, Sunita immediately adopted these recommendations for her livestock.



Within a short span, she noticed a visible transformation her cattle became healthier and more energetic, and the milk yield rose from 13 to 14.5 liters per day. This improvement not only increased her household income but also strengthened her confidence in scientific dairy management.

Sunita's journey reflects how awareness, adoption, and behavioral change can transform traditional dairy farming, making it more productive and sustainable for rural families.
